Paul Clements



Paul Clements, who grew up in the Clogher Valley, is the author of five travel books about Ireland. He has also written two biographies and wrote the introduction to *A Benedict Kiely Reader: Drink to the Bird and Selected Essays* (2024). His new book, *A Year in the Woods: Montalto through the Seasons*, was published by Merrion

Press in 2025. A former BBC assistant editor, he is a regular contributor to the *Irish Times*, writing local history books reviews and Irishman's Diaries. He lives in Belfast with his wife and son.

Shaun O'Byrne



Shaun works as Visitor Experience Coordinator in the Patrick Kavanagh Visitor Centre in Inniskeen in County Monaghan. His talk, **A Sense of Place**, examines how Kavanagh and Carleton used 'place' in their literature to capture habits, manners of life and idioms of speech of the rural Irish in their native Ulster.

William Anderson



Born and bred in Sixmilecross, William has always been interested in the life and works of Rev W F Marshall (1888-1959). He is at present doing an MA in Public History with Queen's University Belfast. His talk today, **The Trails of two Williams,** focuses on the William

Carleton Trail in the Clogher Valley and the William Forbes Marshall trail in Sixmilecross and discovers there is much that unites these two men, the love of language and the love of Tyrone.
